Message from the Chair - Easter Hospitality Reflections

Dear Friends and Colleagues

As the Easter weekend holiday draws near the I wish all our colleagues all the best for a well deserved break. With considerable change happening for hospitality management at numerous universities I couldn't help but reflect and give you some insight to our CHME thoughts and efforts.



This is a time of wonder for Hospitality Management professionals and academics. Reports (i.e. Ignite

economics, 2017; Deloitte, 2018) are recognising the importance of the industry's contribution to the economy, many hospitality management sectors show their resilience in times of crisis and the recent merger of BHA with ALMR has seen the creation of UKhospitality a new, vibrant body that represents hospitality management at the highest of levels. Indeed, it is also a great time for Hospitality Researchers as we have seen a growth of hospitality focused journals. We now have more two and three star rated journals than ever before in the history of Hospitality Management Education. Yet there is a dark cloud in hospitality academia that may conceal the rays of sunlight.

I sense that some of you may feel that it is not the most optimistic of times to be involved in hospitality management education in the United Kingdom. On the one hand, anxiety of European parents sending their children to study in the UK is on the increase due to the uncertainty surrounding Brexit and what it really means for them. On the other the government fee review and increasing competition from hotel schools in Europe means that we are not a top destination in the minds of parents as we once were. A number of hospitality organisations have adopted the view that they do not really need hospitality focused apprenticeships and we have already heard of a couple of universities with historically strong hospitality management departments wishing to discontinue their degrees offerings. In this important period of hospitality management education, I have been asked by my peers to lead the Council of Hospitality Management Education and it is with feelings of humbleness and honour that I chose to accept. I did so because despite the perceived gloom of this period I have a deep optimism and belief that Hospitality Management Education does have a bright future.

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If we focus solely on the now and forget the past or ignore the future we could create a self-fulfilled prophesy.

I believe that Hospitality Management education has only recently entered its teenager phase and, like any teenager, there will be tantrums until balance is restored. Each one of us should consider themselves as the guardian or parent of this teenager. And like good parents we must work closer than ever before to look after our child. We must increase our cooperation within and between our Universities and Further Education Colleges and keep a unified and strong voice. We must do more to engage with our professional colleagues, after all most of them are our alumni! We must do more to embrace colleagues in further education. We must have a more open dialogue with hospitality professionals to highlight the benefits of safekeeping hospitality programmes in higher and further education, including hospitality focused apprenticeships. And we must do more to promote applied research that clearly contributes to both industry and our society.

I am surrounded by great colleagues each one volunteering their time and energy to transform CHME into a thriving organisation that truly supports hospitality management academics. We are building on our long and strong tradition but we are gazing to the future and working on strategic goals that will enable us to better support hospitality pedagogy, research and professionalism. I see great examples of a thriving Hospitality Management Education in Europe, America, China and the rest of the world and that allows me to be more optimistic and more determined than ever to move forward. We are not alone and you are not alone!

We at the CHME executive wish to help as much as we can and we will focus our combined energies to achieve three goals in the next few years:

- 1) Deliver more benefits to both our higher and further education membership.
- 2) Strengthen our links with other similar academic and professional associations around the world.
- 3) Help unite the voice of academics and professionals to enhance the way Hospitality Management is perceived as a career.

There may be troubled waters ahead but we shall navigate them together. Stormy waters after all make for excellent sailors!

- Innovation in Teaching This award is presented to the CHME member who has demonstrated innovation in teaching, learning or assessment. Whilst all innovative practices would be considered, this might take the form of the introduction of a new method or approach to teaching or assessing a traditional hospitality subject, or may be the introduction of a new subject on to the hospitality curricula;
- **Research Impact** This award is presented to the CHME member who has undertaken research in the general area of hospitality management (including education) the results of which have had a positive impact. This impact must be both measurable and demonstrable and whilst all impactful research will be considered for this award, research that has positively benefitted the hospitality industry will be favourably considered.


Student CHME award




